STOP PRESS: LOCAL PLAN NEWS

A current major issue regards East Devon District Council developing a new Local Plan for East Devon and in particular looking to where it is proposed new developments will occur. Page 2 gives details of the proposals for West Hill.

We have been given a clean bill of health on our accounts for 2021/2022. However, a resident had lodged a Notice of Objection on five issues, which they are entitled to do. The External Auditor stated that three issues were not eligible and the remaining two were not accepted for any further consideration. The External Auditor invoiced the Council for £1597.50 plus VAT, as the cost of their extra work. No budget had been set for such an unexpected cost which falls upon the Council and thus the community as a whole. Please go online and read the Minutes of the council meetings for further details.

We want to work with the community to bring about any necessary improvements for West Hill. We are exploring options with community organisations to support residents with the ever rising costs of fuel, food etc.

East Devon Local Plan News

Future Development in West Hill + Ottery St Mary?

East Devon District Council's (EDDC) review of the Local Plan has reached a significant stage. WHPC expects the Draft Local Plan to be published in mid-October for an 8 week public consultation. This will show which sites in West Hill and Ottery St Mary are being put forward for new housing development plus a suite of policies which cover the whole District. During the consultation Cllrs will engage with the community to formulate a response to the consultation. Members of the public can also submit their comments directly to EDDC.

A community drop-in session has been arranged for residents and Cllrs to discuss the proposals.

What is a Local Plan?

Local Plans are used to help decide on planning applications and other planning related decisions. In effect, they are the local guide to what can be built where, shaping infrastructure investments and determining the future pattern of development in the district

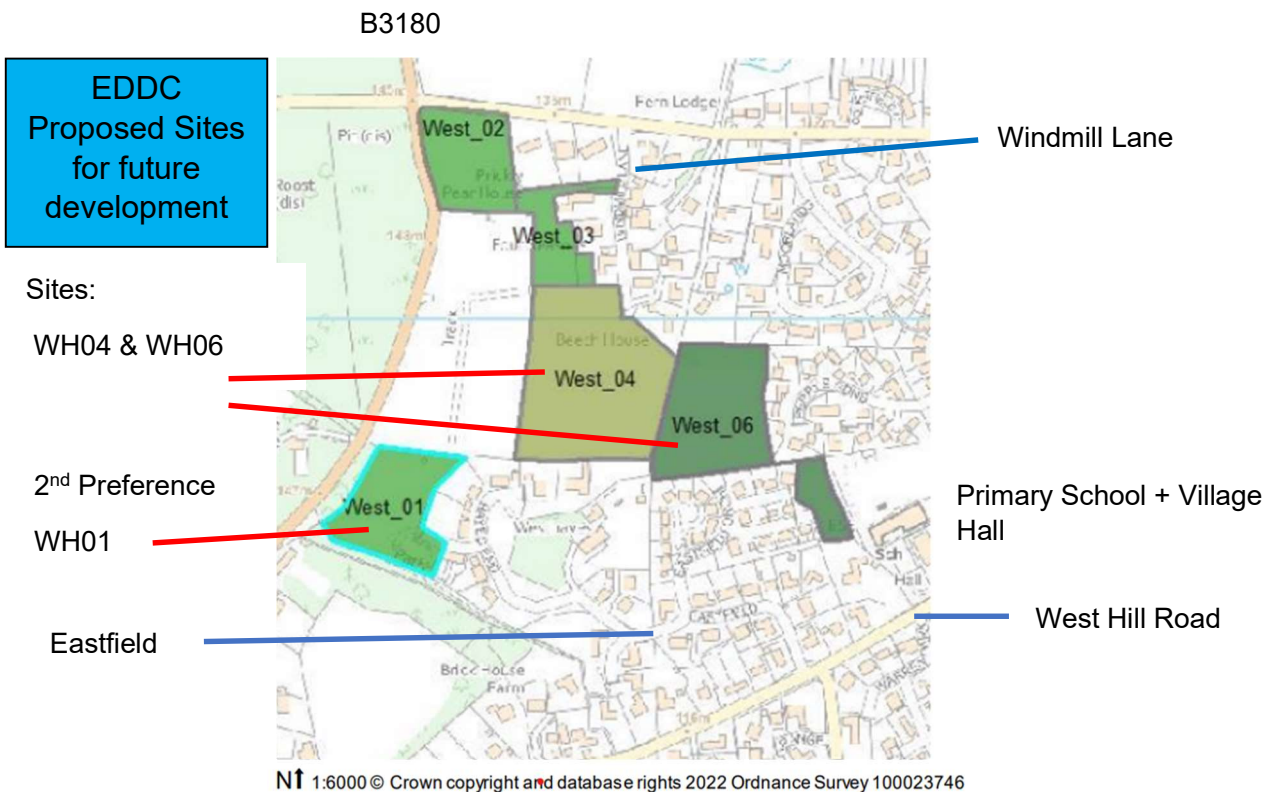
What's planned for West Hill?

EDDC's Strategic Planning Committee (SPC) recently considered site allocations for future housing development in towns and villages, including **West Hill**. These are expected to be in the Local Plan. Further detail is available on the EDDC website.

- 6th Sep: site allocations for towns including Ottery St Mary
- 14th Sep (see note): site allocations for villages including **West Hill**.

Note: This is the expected meeting date at the time of printing

Of the many sites put forward by landowners for consideration, EDDC have stated a preference for only two: WH04 and WH06 north of Eastfield which would provide 51 houses. A 2nd preference is site WH01 at Westhayes (6 Houses). See map below.



Other Planning Matters: Neighbourhood Plan

Ottery St Mary Town Council have indicated they would like to undertake a review of the Neighbourhood Plan. This could involve the two parishes, Ottery St Mary and West Hill, working together as they did before. Alternatively each parish could develop its own new Neighbourhood Plan. Our current thinking is that there are significant advantages for West Hill to have its own Neighbourhood Plan, so that it can focus on maintaining the special character of West Hill. We will need lots of volunteers to help with Neighbourhood Plan preparation – please contact the Parish Clerk if you would like to be involved!

WHPC is delighted to announce the official opening of a new piece of equipment in the playpark, a climbing frame with slide.

Queen's Platinum Jubilee in West Hill



This has been a very special, and now sad year to celebrate the long service of Queen Elizabeth II. The Queen's Jubilee Big Weekend in June seems a long time ago but we hope you have good memories of the many local and national events.

In West Hill the RBL street party was very popular and a great success. Also in June the Pre-school Scarecrow Competition provided some excellent and imaginative interpretations on a Jubilee theme to enjoy around the village.

In addition to the many garden parties other events have taken place to mark The Queen's Jubilee, including:

- The Gardening Club provided a delightful planting scheme of red, white and blue outside of McColls.
- The RBL erected a flagpole at the Legion Clubhouse.
- The Parish Council funded Jubilee Commemorative medals for all children at West Hill Primary School.
- EDDC provided a Jubilee Oak sapling which has been planted on the Courtfield Close green space (it is now actively growing after a very slow start).
- The Parish Council have placed a new Jubilee bench in the St Michael's community garden space and will plant a tree adjacent to it in the Autumn as a memorial to those who passed away during the COVID pandemic.

Remembrance Sunday update

This year Remembrance Sunday is on 13th November. As always there will be a short wreath-laying ceremony at the war memorial followed by a service at St Michael's Church. The Parish Council has applied for permission to close School Lane and a short section of West Hill Road (Elsdon Lane to Bendarroch Road) to reduce the risk to participants during the wreath-laying and to facilitate the walk along School Lane to St Michael's.

We have requested the road closure from 10am to 11.30am on 13th November. Traffic will be diverted using appropriate signage via Elsdon Lane and Lower Broad Oak Road. Emergency services will not be affected. We are confident disruption to drivers will be minimal and hope that residents will understand why we are doing this.

At the time of going to press we have not heard whether Highways have agreed to our request for road closures. Further information will be put on our website and notice boards nearer the time.

Road Safety: Hi Viz vests for children

Last year the Council supplied Hi Viz vests for all the West Hill Primary School children to help them be more visible during the dark winter evenings. It won't be long before the nights start drawing in again this Autumn and we all need to take care when out and about. This year WHPC will provide some more Hi-Viz vests for the new intake at the Primary School and also for the West Hill Pre-school children. Our brightly-coloured youngsters should be easy to see!

Nestled amongst fields within West Hill lies a unique land based project which aims to provide a safe & sensory landscape where young people (from the InFocus Charity), with visual impairments & complex needs can engage with nature. As the site has developed we have now opened our doors to other organisations including the Kings School.

Experience has shown that whoever spends time at the West Hill Outdoor Learning Centre, gets so much out of being here whether through learning new skills or just being & appreciating nature.

The West Hill Outdoor Learning Centre started in March 2017 with a view to supporting young people from the InFocus Charity, based in Exeter. The project is situated in 9 acres close to the Daisymount roundabout & comprises of a forest, wood, meadow, commercial growing facilities & ornamental & productive gardens.

The site is managed by myself, who is full time & a team of dedicated volunteers who spend a few hours each week maintaining & developing the site. We are very creative & so far have created beautiful gardens, shelters, bridges, seats & other features.

We also have a number of corporate volunteer groups who help to undertake projects. So far this year we have had Solicitors Stevens Scown, PR Agency Launch & Submarine Apprentices from the Royal Navy.

When we took over the site – it was wild & run down. It took a year to ‘jungle bust’ – that is to say remove fallen & dead trees, create paths & design the landscape we see today. Throughout the process we have been supported by the sites owner Otter Nurseries who have helped enormously, initially laying tarmac paths (thus providing better accessibility) & over the years donating, compost, soil & other materials.

As a charity, part of the sites remit is to generate an income which we do cultivating herbs which are sold through InFocus Charity shops & organic vegetables that are sold to the Jack in the Green pub. Being involved in growing herbs & veg also gives an opportunity for students to understand where food comes from.

An important aspect of the site is to improve its biodiversity. We achieve this by managing the site carefully through establishing wildflower meadows, woodland corridors & building log piles. We have also planted several hundred native trees, thanks to the Woodland Trust Trees for Schools programme.



In its' 5th year, the landscape has now matured & has become beautiful & productive. This year we had two Open Days which were extremely successful in that we were able to introduce the landscape & our work to many local people. Next year we are planning on opening the landscape to the National Gardens Scheme.

West Hill Parish Council welcomes feedback and correspondence from residents. We'd like to highlight a few recent examples including one that took 2 years to resolve.

Responsible dog ownership

The Parish Council has been contacted by a number of residents over the summer about noise from barking dogs. We appeal to dog owners to be mindful of neighbours and not allow dogs to bark excessively. EDDC's Environmental Health team advise talking it over with your neighbour and always remember to reward your dog's quiet behaviour.

Bonfires

It's helpful to know that there are no laws prohibiting bonfires altogether, or specifying times when you can light a bonfire, but there are laws which might apply if the smoke causes a nuisance. Also, anyone lighting a fire and allowing smoke to drift across a road faces a fine of up to £2000, and concerns about highway safety should be reported to the Police.

The EDDC website www.eastdevon.gov.uk has lots of useful information. If bonfires are causing a nuisance they recommend that you contact the householder to explain the problem to them. If this approach fails – contact the Environmental Health service by filling in an on-line form or emailing environmentalhealth@eastdevon.gov.uk. Or call 01395 517456.

Overgrown hedges?

Landowners and occupiers are required by law to trim any hedge next to the public highway where the growth is preventing the passage, or affecting the safety, of the highway user.

If overgrown hedges are blocking a pavement or causing a road safety issue they can be reported directly to DCC Highways via their "report a problem" webpage on www.devon.gov.uk

Aircraft Noise over West Hill?

Did you know that you can report low-flying or noisy aircraft directly to Exeter Airport? **It's important to log the date and time of the incident. Double yellow lines?

In 2020 residents in the Bendarroch Road area contacted the Parish Council to highlight the problems caused by cars parked on both sides of Bendarroch Road. Whilst this had the benefit of making vehicles slow down there were times when larger vehicles couldn't pass through.

The Parish Council sent a letter to residents in the area asking for their co-operation and to park considerately. Sadly, the problems persisted. WHPC then met with DCC Cllr Jess Bailey and a DCC Highways Officer on site to discuss the possible solutions such as installing double yellow lines. Little did we know that the Highways HATOC process to consider and approve this takes 18-24 months.

Success! in Aug 2022 DCC Highways made their decision and yellow lines will soon be painted on a short section of Bendarroch Road alongside the junction with St Mary's View.
