PART 1 – GENERAL PROVISIONS

Definitions

In this Code -

"Member" includes a Co-opted Member

"Relevant person" means:

- you or
- your spouse or civil partner; or
- a person with whom you are living as husband and wife or as if they were civil
 partners and you are aware that that other person has an interest

"relevant period" means a period of 12 months ending with the date on which you notified the Monitoring Officer of an interest

"interest or interests" have the meanings set out in Part 2 of this Code "meeting" means any meeting of –

- the Council;
- any of the Council's Committees, Sub-Committees, Working Groups one or more Members, formal or informal and with or without officers, relating to the discharge of the Council's functions where a formal record is made by a Council officer

1. Public Duty and Private Interests: An introduction

- 1.1 This Code applies to every Elected and Co-opted Member of West Hill Parish Council ("the Council").
- 1.2 You should have regard to the Principles of Public Life namely, Selflessness, Honesty/Integrity, Objectivity, Accountability, Openness, Personal judgment, Respect for others, Duty to uphold the law, Stewardship and Leadership.
- 1.3 When acting in your capacity as an Elected or Co-opted Member of the Council
 - (a) you must act solely in the public interest and should never improperly confer an advantage or disadvantage on any person or act to gain financial or other material benefits for yourself, your family, a friend or close associate;
 - (b) you must not place yourself under a financial or other obligation to outside individuals or organisations who might seek to influence you in the performance of your official duties;
 - (c) when carrying out your public duties you must make all choices, such as making public appointments, awarding contracts or recommending individuals for rewards or benefits, on merit;
 - (d) you are accountable for your decisions to the public and you must co-operate fully with whatever scrutiny is appropriate to your office;

- (e) you must be as open as possible about your decisions and actions and the decisions and actions of the Council and should be prepared to give reasons for those decisions and actions in accordance with any statutory requirements and any reasonable additional requirements imposed by the Council;
- (f) you must not act or speak on behalf of the Council unless you are representing a position which the Council have previously agreed. If you are acting as an individual you must state very clearly that you are expressing a personal opinion and you do not speak on behalf of the authority. You must also not include the name of any Officer, use the Council logo or the Council's address and telephone number(s) as a point of contact. If you are responding to a situation and you are unable to ascertain the Council's position, you should respond to the best of your knowledge and ability in the interim and report back to the Council as soon as practicable;
- (g) you must declare any private interests, whether disclosable or personal, which relate to your public duties and must take steps to resolve any conflicts arising in a way which protects the public interest, including registering and declaring interests in a manner conforming with the procedures set out at Part 2 of this Code:
- (h) you must, when using or authorising the use by others of the resources of the Council, ensure that such resources are not used improperly for political purposes (including party political purposes) and that any use is in accordance with the Council's reasonable requirements;
- (i) you must have regard to any applicable Local Authority Code of Publicity made under the Local Government Act 1986 or any similar Communications Protocol or Code produced by the Council;
- (j) you must have regard to the Codes and protocols forming part of the Council's Standing Orders;
- (k) you must promote and support high standards of conduct when serving in your public post, in particular as characterised by the above requirements, by leadership and example.
- 1.4 Whilst you may be strongly influenced by the views of others, it is your responsibility alone to decide what view to take on any question which Members have to decide.
- 1.5 The Council and any of its Members should always seek to represent well-informed, objective and factual position.
- 1.6 Please refer to the Council's media protocols which describe how the Council expects its Members to share information with the media, including social media. (Note WHPC Media Policy to be developed during 2021-22)
- 1.7 Do nothing as a Member which you could not justify to the public.
- 1.8 The reputation of the Council depends on your conduct and what the public believes about your conduct.
- 1.9 It is not enough to avoid actual impropriety, you should at all times avoid any occasion for suspicion or appearance of improper conduct.
- 1.10 It is your responsibility to comply with the provisions of this Code.

2. Scope

- 2.1 You must comply with this Code whenever you are acting in your official capacity, when:
 - (a) you are engaged on the business of the Council; or
 - (b) you behave so as to give a reasonable person the impression that you are acting as a representative of the Council.

3. General obligations

3.1 You <u>must</u> –

- (a) treat others with courtesy and respect,
- (b) when reaching decisions on any matter, do so on the merits of the circumstances and in the public interest <u>and</u> have reasonable regard to any relevant advice provided to you by an officer of the Council.
- (c) Before making any written allegation to the Monitoring Officer about the conduct of another Member of this authority or a Member of one of the other Parish or Town Councils within East Devon or the District Council you shall first consult with the District Council's Monitoring Officer.

3.2 You must not -

- (a) attempt to use your position as a Member improperly to confer on or secure for yourself or any other person, an advantage or disadvantage;
- (b) do anything which may cause the Council to breach a statutory duty or any of the equality enactments (as defined in section 33 of the Equality Act 2010);
- (c) bully any person (bullying may be characterised as any single act or pattern of offensive, intimidating, malicious, insulting or humiliating behaviour; an abuse or misuse of power or authority which attempts to undermine or coerce or has the effect of undermining or coercing an individual or group of individuals by gradually eroding their confidence or capability which may cause them to suffer stress or fear);
- (d) intimidate or attempt to intimidate any person who is or is likely to be -
 - (i) a complainant,
 - (ii) a witness, or
 - (iii) involved in the administration of any investigation or proceedings,

in relation to an allegation that any Member has failed to comply with the Council's Code of Conduct; or

- (e) do anything which compromises or is likely to compromise the impartiality of those who work for, or on behalf of, the Council;
- (f) disclose information given to you in confidence by anyone, or information acquired by you which you believe, or ought reasonably to be aware, is of a confidential nature, except where –

- (i) you have the consent of a person authorised to give it;
- (ii) you are required by law to do so;
- (iii) the disclosure is made to a third party for the purpose of obtaining professional advice provided that the third party agrees not to disclose the information to any other person; or
- (iv) the disclosure is -
 - (A) in the public interest; and
 - (B) made in good faith and
 - (C) in compliance with the reasonable requirements of the Council;
- (g) prevent another person from gaining access to information to which that person is entitled by law;
- (h) conduct yourself in a manner or behave in such a way so as to give a reasonable person the impression that you have brought your office or the Council into disrepute.
- (i) act as agent for people pursuing planning matters within the Council's area

PART 2 - INTERESTS

4. Registration of Interests

- 4.1 You must, within 28 days of—
 - (a) this Code being adopted by, or applied to, the Council; or
 - (b) your taking office as a Member or Co-opted Member of the Council,

whichever is the later, and annually thereafter, provide written notification to the District Council's Monitoring Officer of:

- (i) any disclosable pecuniary interest as defined by Regulations made by the Secretary of State, where the pecuniary interest is yours, your spouse's or civil partner's, or is the pecuniary interest of somebody with whom you are living with as a husband or wife or as if you were civil partners); and
- (ii) any other personal; interest laid down by the Council, as set out at paragraph 6 below

which will be recorded in the Council's Register of Members' Interests and made available for public inspection including on the District Council's website at www.eastdevon.gov.uk.

- 4.2 Within 28 days of becoming aware of any new interest or change to any interest already registered, you must register details of that new interest or change by providing written notification to the Council's Monitoring Officer.
- 4.3 Whether or not an interest within paragraphs 5.1 and 6.1-6.5 below has been entered onto the Council's register, you must disclose any interest to any meeting at which you are present in any matter being considered in line with para below, where the matter is not a 'sensitive interest'
- 4.4 Following any disclosure of an interest not on the Council's register or the subject of pending notification, you must notify the Monitoring Officer of the interest within 28 days beginning with the date of disclosure.
- 4.5 In relation to disclosable pecuniary interests, in this Part of the Code the expressions in the left hand column below have the meanings attributed to them in the right hand column:

"body in which the relevant person has a beneficial interest"	means a firm in which the relevant person is a partner or a body corporate of which the relevant person is a director or in the securities of which the relevant person has a beneficial interest
"director"	includes a Member of the committee of management of an industrial and provident society
"land"	excludes an easement, servitude, interest, or right over land which does not carry with it a right for the relevant person (alone or jointly with another) to occupy the land or to receive income
" Member"	Includes a co-opted Member
"relevant authority"	means the authority of which you are a Member

"relevant person"	means you, your spouse or civil partner, a person with whom you are living with as husband and wife or a person with whom you are living with as if you are civil partners
"securities"	means shares, debentures, debenture stock, loan stock, bonds, units of a collective investment scheme within the meaning of the Financial Services and Markets Act 2000 and other securities of any description, other than money deposited with a building society

4.6 The interests you must register are:

5. Disclosable pecuniary interests

- 5.1 those disclosable pecuniary interests defined by The Relevant Authorities (Disclosable Pecuniary Interests) Regulations 2012 (SI 2012/ 1464) as set out below, namely:
 - (a) any employment, office, trade, profession or vocation carried on for profit or gain by you or a relevant person;
 - (b) any payment or provision of any other financial benefit (other than from the Council) made or provided within the relevant period in respect of any expenses incurred in carrying out duties as a Member, or towards your election expenses, including any payment or financial benefit from a trade union within the meaning of the Trade Union and Labour Relations (Consolidation) Act 1992;
 - (c) any contract which is made between you, or so far as you are aware a relevant person (as defined at Para 2 above) (or a body in which the relevant person has a beneficial interest) and the Council:
 - (1) under which goods or services are to be provided or works are to be executed;
 - (2) which has not been fully discharged
 - (d) any beneficial interest in land held by you or so far as you are aware a relevant person which is within the administrative area of the Council;
 - (e) any licence (alone or jointly with others) to occupy land in the administrative area of the Council for a month or longer
 - (f) any tenancy where (to your knowledge):
 - (1) the landlord is the Council; and
 - (2) the tenant is a body in which you or so far as you are aware a relevant person has a beneficial interest.
 - (g) any beneficial interest that you, or so far as you are aware a relevant person has in securities of a body where:
 - (1) that body (to your knowledge) has a place of business or land in the administrative area of the Council and

(2) either:

- (A) the total nominal value of the securities exceeds £25,000 or one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that body; or
- (B) if the share capital of that body is of more than one class, the total nominal value of the shares of any one class in which the relevant person has a beneficial interest exceeds one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that class.

6. Personal interests

- 6.1 Those other personal interests laid down by the Council, namely your membership of any body to which you have been appointed by the Council or exercising functions of a public nature, directed to charitable purposes or whose principal purposes include influence of public opinion or policy, including your membership of any other local Authority, any political party or trade union
- 6.2 Any land where the landlord is the Council and the Member is, or a firm in which the Member is a partner or a company of which the Member is a remunerated director is the tenant
- 6.3 Any easement, servitude, interest or right in or over land which does not carry with it a right for you (alone or jointly with another) to occupy the land or to receive income.
- 6.4 Any gifts or hospitality worth more than an estimated value of £25 which you have received by virtue of your office
- 6.5 Any financial interest of a member of your family or a person who is a close associate. For the purposes of this clause 6.5:
 - "member of your family" means partner i.e. someone you are married to, your civil partner, or someone you live with in a similar capacity, a parent, a parent in law, a son or daughter, a stepson or step daughter, the child of a partner, a brother or sister, a brother or sister of your partner, a grandparent, a grandchild, an uncle or aunt, a nephew or niece and the partners of any of these people.
 - "close associate" means someone that you are in regular contact with over a period of time who is more than an acquaintance or colleague. It may be a friend, a business associate or someone you know through general social contacts. It is someone who a reasonable member of the public might think you would be prepared to favour or disadvantage when discussing a matter that affects them.
- 6.6 In addition to those interests listed at 6.1 to 6.5 above which you are required to register, you may wish also to declare membership of any body which, in your view, might create a conflict of interest in carrying out your duties as a Councillor, such as membership of the Freemasons or any similar body.
- 6.7 Where the Council's Monitoring Officer agrees that any information relating to your interests is "sensitive information" namely information whose availability for inspection by the public is likely to create a serious risk which any person may be subjected to violence or intimidation, you need not include that information when registering that interest, or, as the case may be, any change to that interest.
- 6.8 You must, within 28 days of becoming aware of any change of circumstances which means that information excluded is no longer sensitive information, notify the District Council's Monitoring Officer asking that the information be included in the Council's Register of Members' Interests.

7. Declaration of Interests and participation at meetings

- 7.1 Unless a dispensation has been granted, you may not participate in any discussion of, vote on, or discharge any function related to any matter in which you have a disclosable pecuniary interest as defined by Regulations referred to at para 5.1. These prohibitions apply to any form of participation, including speaking as a member of the public
 - 7.2.1 You must also observe the restrictions the Council may also place on your involvement in matters where you have a personal interest as defined by the Council and shown at paras 6.1 to 6.6 above.
 - 7.2.2 In relation to the interest outlined at 6.5 above, the councillor shall disclose the nature of the matter and not vote on the matter. They may speak on the matter only if members of the public are also allowed to speak at the meeting.
- 7.2 You also have a personal interest in any business of your authority where a reasonable person with knowledge of the relevant facts would regard the interest as greater than would affect the majority of residents or inhabitants in the affected area such that it is likely to prejudice your judgment of the public interest.
- 7.3 Where you have any interest in <u>any</u> business of the Council and you attend <u>any</u> meeting at which that business is to be considered, you must:
 - (a) disclose to that meeting the existence and nature of that interest but where your interest is sensitive you are not required to disclose the interest but merely the fact there is an interest in the matter concerned.
 - (b) disclose any interest in accordance with the Council's reasonable requirements, no later than the commencement of the consideration of the business in which you have that interest, or (if later) the time at which the interest becomes apparent to you;
 - (c) where you have a disclosable pecuniary interest, withdraw from the room or chamber where a meeting considering the business is being held at the commencement of the consideration of that business in which you have that interest, or (if later) the time at which the interest becomes apparent to you unless you have obtained a dispensation from the Council's Monitoring Officer or the Standards Committee;
 - (d) not seek to influence improperly any decision about that business.
